Iolanthe Takes Wing at Brown, April 2009

Brown University Gilbert and Sullivan (BUGS) is an organization still in the springtime of its life (fa la la), but it has reached the point where it begins to repeat the most popular shows. Last year, BUGS put on its second *Mikado*, a radical departure from its first, and this year it staged its second *Iolanthe*. The organization has gained visibility and even clout in the Brown community in the last five years. Whereas its first *Iolanthe* was produced in a large lecture hall with no stage or theater equipment, this second production ran in an auditorium with a stage and lights and an enormous set. This was a delightful presentation with excellent performances (as was the first), but the added legitimacy of the setup may have worked to its detriment.

The stage at Brown's Alumnae Auditorium is small and narrow. To be lit with the new lights of which BUGS is proud, the action had to take place fairly far back, and the ambitious set encroached from the sides. This resulted in a very constricted stage; for whatever reason, separation from the audience was absolute this time around. The choreography of the fairies, in a graceful modern-dance mode, was suitable to the space, though you couldn't say that they tripped hither and thither, exactly. The peers (all eight of them) were crowded, and this made them less impressive. In 2005, the peers processed through and around the audience, and when they admonished the lower middle classes, they were right in our middle-class faces. This year, the peers were far away and could only shuffle amongst themselves, albeit charmingly.

But enough carping! The cast were outstanding singers and actors, with a sturdy Strephon (Alex Wankel) and his demure mother (Sarah Rosenthal), the most sylphlike of fairies. Philip Arevalo definitely earned his wings as Private Willis, standing motionless in his sentry-box not only through the first act but also through the intermission, before wowing us with his performance of "When all night long a chap remains." Nick Leiserson and Ravi Ramanathan were adorable as Lords Mountararat and Tolloller, though in this day and age, there's not much giggle left in their realization that they like each other a whole lot more than they do Phyllis. Audrey Chait was more than a match for them; she played Phyllis as an earthy, engaging comedienne, and came close to stealing the show. Maggie Machiaek made a strong, rather loony, Queen of the Fairies and David Deull a gracefully mopey Chancellor.

Congratulations to BUGS for weathering the transition from the founders' generation to the worthy successors! In an organization driven by undergraduates, generations are short, but BUGS has proved that it is not merely a one-shot collection of like-minded enthusiasts, but a campus fixture.

On Sunday, July 12, Dick and I drove to Farmington, NH, to see the Lakes Region Opera presentation of *The Pirates of Penzance*. It was a trip well taken.

The company produced a remarkable version of *Pirates*. Stage director, **Jane Cormier** and music director **Carlos Martinez**, showed what can be done with a small

cast, an orchestra of a violin, a cello and a piano and a stage with almost no scenery. **Stephanie Kruskol** (Mabel) and **John Coons** (Frederic) had voices the equal of any we have heard within recent memory and they were good actors to boot. The chorus of maidens (6 in all) and the pirates (equally 6 in all) seemed to be enjoying themselves, and this showed in their singing and acting.

To add to the fun, the policemen (4!) had very good voices; one of them broke into a dance resembling the Rockettes at Radio City Music Hall. **Nicholas Ianotti** was an excellent Major General. A very very nice touch was the inclusion of **Christopher** and **Catherine Martinez** (young son and daughter of **Jane Cormier** and **Carlos Martinez**). Christopher was a cabin boy; Catherine was one of the maidens and each sang their assigned roles beautifully. The pity of it all is that there were only two performances so that any chance to see this Pirates is gone - - alas!

Worcester Opera Works: From London to Vienna-An Evening of Operetta

Worcester Opera Works (WOW) presented the concert *From London to Vienna- An Evening of Operetta* as a part of their sixth annual concert series on Wednesday, July 29, 2009, 7:30 PM. The concert took place in the airconditioned Briarwood Community Center in Worcester, MA. There was a nice mix of G&S and other operetta, both standard and lesser known, performed to an enthusiastic and appreciative audience. The concert was narrated by Mr. **Richard Kimball**, who did an admirable job. **Olga Rogach** served as the excellent pianist for the evening.

The concert opened with two songs from *The Sorcerer*, "John Wellington Wells", energetically conveyed by **Tom Frates** and "Time was when love and I", sensitively sung by **John Healy**. The first half also featured a few excerpts from *Pirates of Penzance*. **Sandra Fritz**, as Ruth, offered a broad presentation with good comic timing. **Chris Flynn Zini**, as Frederic, had a light, clear lyric tenor, which he also displayed in "Take a pair of sparkling eyes" from *The Gondoliers*. **Becky Ufema** projected a lovely stage presence as Mabel. We were also treated to "Lover Come Back to Me" from *The New Moon* beautifully sung by the warm-voiced **Donna Dewitt**, a fun and witty rendition of "Art Is Calling For Me" by **Elaine Crane**, who charmed us with her brilliant high notes and charisma and a piece from *The Bohemian*

Girl, featuring the gorgeous voice of **Rebecca Hains**. The first half concluded with "The Merry Widow Waltz" elegantly sung and danced by **Elaine Crane and John Healy**.

Miss **Ufema** opened the second half of the program with a spirited rendition of "Glitter and Be Gay". Sandra Fritz returned, armed with props, to perform Mad Margaret's aria from Ruddigore. Rebecca Hains gave us a gracious portraval of Yum-Yum in her beautiful and heart-felt version of "The sun whose rays are all ablaze". Tom Frates entertained us with "The Sidewalks of New York' from The Red Mill. Elaine Crane's Josephine was really lovely, as was the duet "None shall part us" featuring Donna Dewitt and Tom Frates. A wonderful surprise was the hilarious love song to a bottle, called "Lovely you" from The Doctor in Spite of Himself, splendidly performed by Mr. Zini. Donna Dewitt shined in "I built upon a rock" from Princess Ida. She offered a simple, clear presentation, paired with a seamless legato line to great effect. John Healy, as the Pirate King, led the entire company on stage for "Oh better far to live and die" and "Hail Poetry" in a satisfying conclusion to an entertaining evening.

This concert helped to raise money for WOW's upcoming season, including *Die Fledermaus*, to be performed in English, on June 11-13, 2010, at Worcester Academy's historic Warner Theatre.

Immediately below you will find a description of a collection of Gilbert and Sullivan LPs, vocal scores, books, and ephemera that have been donated by Holly Fulton, daughter of Mary Howe Shepard. This affords me an opportunity to reminisce about the immortal NEGASS picnics hosted by Mrs. Shepard.

For many years this annual event in August was my favorite day in the entire calendar. It began with a drive to Providence where we would attend a delightful G&S performance by Ocean State Light Opera ("OSLO"). Their company included a young woman who was a demon on roller skates. We would then proceed to the Shepards' lovely estate in Bristol Rhode Island where we were joined by OSLO cast members. For several hours we would gambol on the Shepards' enormous lawn and swim in their private ocean. Live accompaniment was provided on the porch by Nancy and Bill Burdine's wind ensemble (which had also played at the Schwarzenegger/ Shriver wedding). Then the grills were fired up, and we would cook our main courses and

partake of side dishes brought "to share". This was a rare opportunity for my family members to eat hot dogs, which we never had at home. Thank you, Bill and Carol Mahoney! And ah, those memorable fruit salads and brownies ... Then as it grew too dim to see, we would gather inside in the Shepards' living room for a meeting. With piano accompaniment we would sing through one of the G&S operas from top to bottom, with dialogue. And then late late into the night we would wend our way back home to Boston ...

Those August days were pure unalloyed joy for young and old. We were grateful for and humbled by the Shepards' generosity and hospitality. And they kept insisting we were doing them a favor! Thank you, dear Shepards. And thank you, Holly, for remembering us.
